EXCHANGEITES SEE WONDERS WROUGHT BY "ELECTRIC EYE"

A Match Lights Electric Bulb, Rings Bell, By Rays Human Eye Cannot See

How through modern science an electric bulb may be lighted with a match, a bell may be rung with a flashlight, sounds may be made with a ray of light invisible to the human eye but "visible" to "the electric eye" which makes all these wonders possible, was demonstrated to members of Farmington and Northville Exchange clubs Wednesday noon at a joint meeting of the two groups in Northville.

The businessmen of the two towns watched in amazement at Stanley R. Manning, of the engineering department of Michigan Bell Telephone Company, created sounds out of a loudspeaker by means of a ray of light they could not see, then stopped the sounds by stepping into the path of the invisible ray of light, and started the sounds again by stepping away. Lighting a match in front of the "electric eye" caused it to react so that an electric bulb was lighted a dozen feet away. After causing sounds to emit from a loudspeaker by turning an ordinary flashlight ray upon the "electric eye," he "played a tune" by merely drawing an ordinary comb back and forth in front of the flashlight. The teeth of the comb, interrupting the light, caused interruption of the sounds for a tiny fraction of a second, the spaces between the teeth each "opening the circuit" for a similar short space of time, and permitting the sound to occur again.

An interesting circumstance is that while the "electric eye" is comparatively new, Mr. Manning said, the principle underlying it was discovered over 60 years ago by a young telegraph operator in Ireland. The discovery lay dormant for decades, until developed, first by a Russian, Mr. Manning said.

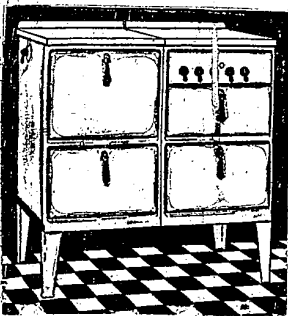
