ALLEGED DRUNKEN DRIVER WILL BE EXAMINED FEB. 9th

Pontiac Judge To Hear Story Of Automobile Striking Child

Examination of Fred Keifer, 57, 14521 St. Mary's avenue, Detroit, on a charge of drunken driving is to be held in Justice H. Russell Holland's court at Pontiac next Thursday. The charge follows an accident Sunday January 22, when his car ran down a seven-year old Farmington Township boy who had just left a church bus on Eight Mile Road. The drunken driving charge was made by Deputy Sheriff Joseph D. Vriend, after interviewing witnesses of the accident.

Keifer, going west on Eight Mile Road, struck the child as he darted across the road behind a bus, taking children home from Our Lady of Sorrows church. Keifer was placed in the Oakland County jail until the next morning, when he was arraigned before Judge Holland. He pleaded not guilty and was released on \$750 bail. The examination scheduled for Thursday of last week, was postponed for two weeks.

An interesting aspect of the case will be the personalities it brings together in reference to the attorneys. Norman C. Orr, former prosecutor, defeated by a close margin last November for another term by Prosecutor Arthur P. Bogue, will defend Keifer. Opposing him probably will be Assistant Prosecutor Patrick Lynch, which will be one of the first cases in which former Prosecutoy Orr has opposed one of the staff of the new prosecuting attorney since the latter took office four weeks ago.

A Home-Made Hair Dryer
