**Farmers Can Effect
Truck Tax Legislation**

Detroit, Mich.—The country's farmers, the largest single group of motor truck owners in the United States, are likely to be most affected by legislation which probably will be introduced during the next few months in 43 states to further restrict, regulate and heavily tax trucks, according to Harvey C. Fruehauf, Detroit automotive man and nationally-known highway transportation figure.

Mr. Fruehauf recently completed exhaustive study of highway transportation. His statistics show that 26 per cent of the motor trucks in operation today are owned by farmers.

"Much of the legislation to be introduced in the 43 states," Mr. Fruehauf said, "is being widely exploited as a cure for many of the ills suffered by the country's railroads, which contend that motor trucks are hauling much of the freight that formerly went to railroads."

"The facts show that there is no justification for the contention that the plight of the railroads is due to truck competition. Present business conditions are to blame. Charge of industrial production and railroad freight operations in this country from 1899 until the present time show a close parallel. When industrial production was up rail freight movements were up proportionately and vice versa."

"The potential capacity of all motor trucks and trailers approximates 8 million tons, while that of railroad freight cars is about 108 million tons. Another factor is that 86 per cent of all motor trucks today are privately owned and operated and that the bulk of the tonnage is handled in the short haul field. Even for the common carrier trucker, the average length of route is but 88 miles."

CUT HIGHWAY COSTS

Lansing, Mich.—Due to the use of State Highway Department revenues to reduce local highway taxes, the department in 1933 will spend less than one dollar per inhabitant of Michigan for new highway construction. This amount may be reduced if gasoline tax collections fall below \$20,000,000 during the year. No portion of State Highway Department revenues come from property taxes.

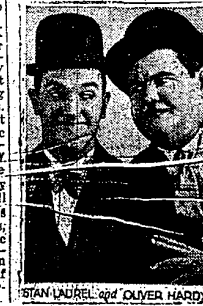
Based On Rath Novel
