

Farmers Can Effect Truck Tax Legislation

Detroit, Mich.—The country's farmers, the largest single group of motor truck; owners, in the United States, are likely to be most affected by legislation which probably will be introduced during the next few months in 43 states to further restrict, regulate and heavily tax trucks, according to Harvey C. Fruehauf, Detroit automotive man and nationally-known highway transportation figure.

Mr. Fruehauf recently com-pleted exhaustive study of high-way transportation. His statistics show that 26 per cent of the motor trucks in operation today are own-
