

**BANKER FAVORS,
AN INFLATION BY
PAYMENT OF BONUS**

Immediate payment of the two-
billion dollar "bonus" to World
War service men was urged by
Fred S. Case, vice-president and
cashier of the First National
Bank of South St. Marie, in a talk
at the annual gathering of the
Sault Kiwanis Club and Grangers
of Chippewa county.

Mr. Case declared that after
much consideration of methods in
which to get purchasing power
back quickly into the hands of
the people, he had decided defini-
tely in favor of inflation of
American currency. "I can think
of but one method to get it into
the hands of the people and life-
blood of business quickly," he said,
"and that is through immediate
payment of the bonus."

"If the bonus money can be
raised by a moderate inflation,
without in any way raising the
obligations of the taxpayers, over
two billion dollars would be in
circulation sixty days after the
checks were mailed from Wash-
ington and it would reach every
city, every county, every township
and every cross roads in the
United States at the same time,
putting a new life into business
and a new hope into the hearts of
the people."

Mr. Case declared that this in-
flation would get rid of the obli-
gation to the soldiers, without
one cent of cost to the taxpayers.
He appealed to the farmers to
write to the officers of the nat-
ional farm organizations urging
them to stand for "moderate con-
trolled inflation which would raise
the price of all commodities of the
farm which are the foundation of
the nation's business."

The Sault banker pointed out
that three years ago a farmer
could have paid a dollar debt
with a bushel of wheat or other
equivalent crop; now it takes
three, a \$75 or \$100 debt could
have been paid with one cow,
now it takes three or more. He
claimed that this means that the
dollar today is overvalued and
commodities undervalued. The
cure, he said, is the inflation of
currency.
