CLARENCEVILLE MAN DIES FOLLOWING HEART ATTACK

Thomas J. Jones died March 11 at his home in Clarenceville at the age of 61. A sudden attack was the cause.

He was born October 10, 1871, in Lampeter, Wales. In 1909 he married Miss Margaret Humphrey. He is survived by his widow, and four sons, Arthur, John, David, and Hugh. A fifth son, Thomas Roland Jones, died five days after his birth.

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
