WALLED LAKE MAN HONORED ON HIS 93rd BIRTHDAY

Perry Austin Active And Alert Despite Age Is Pioneer Resident.

Perry Austin was honored with a birthday party and celebrated his 93rd birthday at the home of his son, Will Austin of Pontiac Saturday evening.

Mr. Austin came to this vicinity 38 years ago and located with his wife on what is now known as the Jones farm on Fourteen Mile Road. In 1906 they moved to Walled Lake and purchased a home on East Lake Drive, which he still owns.

Mr. Austin was born on a farm one mile west of Howell on Grand River Avenue in 1840. The old homestead still stands there.

On January 1, 1866 he married Sarah Van Atta. Seven children were born to them. They are Mrs. J. A. Devereaux and Mrs. Bruce McKnight of Walled Lake, Charles of Clarkston, John of Pasadena, California, Mrs. Bert Sanbro of Salem, and Mrs. Mary Hoab deceased who lived at Salem. Mrs. Austin died in June 1923.

The Austins were pioneers of Livingston County and Mr. Austin's sister was the first white baby born in that county. All living children were present except John. There were 12 guests at the dinner.

Mr. Austin enjoys comparatively good health and is mentally keen and alert. He received many congratulations and birthday cards.

GROW AZTEC VEGETABLE
