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## Steve Danosi Places Third In Fencing

Steve Danosi, Wayne State University freshman from Southfield and son of Tartar fencing coach Istvan Danosi, placed third in the sabre competition at the annual Canadian Memorial Hero fencing tournament in London, Ont.

The 18-year-old WSU fencer, 1971 national 19-under champion, was one place behind Southfield's Bill Goering in the standings. Danosi was two touches shy of first place in the tournament which is conducted via round-robin competition.

Young Danosi was 1970 Michigan senior foil champion and won the Canadian National junior foil championship in 1969 and 1970 before being converted to sabre in the summer of 1970.

# Garden City East Gets Revenge; Belts West 33-14 In Rival Clash

Clutch fourth down plays and two shifty backs helped Garden City East belt Garden City West 33-14 and gain revenge for West's upset tie last year.

The well-coached Panthers broke open a tight game in the second half for their seventh football win of the season. East, a Mid-Wayne Conference champion, was led by junior halfback Dennis Burton, who gained more than 200 yards in 28 carries. West, a Tri-River Conference co-champion, had a 6-2 record before the game, identical to East.

THE GAME began as a possible repeat of last year's tie with West's defense holding East to two touchdowns in the first half. West's offense perked up in second half and at one point East led 13-8.

West's Ron Wolfstrom came up with a great play on the second play of the game, stealing an interception on a Steven Orr to Jim Wisniewski

pass. East's defense plugged the middle against West's stack 1 offense and scored after a West punt.

Orr, East's 5-foot-8 quarterback, whipped a 18 yard pass completion to tight end Luis Santos. Burton ripped off nine yards on a run and Orr added six to give the Panthers a first down on the West 34. After gaining only three yards on three tries, Orr zipped 31 yards for the touchdown on an option. Orr and Burton spent most of the evening running out of West tacklers' arms.

East drove to the West 17 after stopping West on its second offensive try, but a fumble killed the scoring chance. During the drive, Burton broke the 1,000 yard barrier. He ended with more than 1,200 yards for his first season as a starter for East. A 40-yard drive produced the next East touchdown. A roughing the kicker penalty let West get out of a deep hole, but a short punt gave East the ball on the Tiger's 40.

A key play in the drive was Orr's sneak at the West 30 on a fourth down. With inches to go, Orr just barely squirmed past the first down marker.

Burton seemed to have a touchdown one play later, but ran into his own tackle just as he broke into the open. Alex Patterson covered the last 14 yards on the next play, though, to give East a 13-0 lead with about eight minutes left in the first half.

West seemed to get its offense moving just before the end of the half but an interception ended the drive. Jim Arner picked off a Dave Wiecek pass; the half ended without further scoring.

WEST'S JIM SIMMS, one of the Tiger captains, took over the game at the beginning of the second half. Simms blasted through the East line an incredible 12 carries in a row, moving the ball from the West 25 to the East 10. Simms came off limping slightly, obviously weary, just in time to see his replacement

score. Bill Wilcox scored the touchdown and also ran in a two point conversion, making the extra miss after East's second touchdown look important.

However, the Panthers came back to move comfortably out of reach by the end of the third quarter.

Burton picked up important yards in the drive, including another crucial fourth down gain. An Orr to Wisniewski pass, a fourth and seven play, gave East a first down at the West 10. Orr scored from nine yards out and East led 20-8 at the beginning of the fourth quarter.

West kept the game close with a drive early in the fourth quarter. Simms started where he left off on West's first scoring drive. He slashed for

10 yards, the Dave Wiecek hit Steven Jacunski on an 18 yard pass play.

Wiecek missed end John Murray on the next pass play but it didn't make any difference as East's Rich Jose was called for interference. West had a first down on the East 24 when Simms shot for 14, then carried for the touchdown on the next play. West trailed only 20-14 with 9:30 left after missing a try for two on the extra point.

Two long gainers put the game away for East. Patterson raced for 45 yards to the West 17, West co-captain Kirk Lewis saving a touchdown with a tackle. From there, East struggled across for the score, again needing a clutch fourth down play. A fourth and two at the nine became a first down by inches

on a Patterson run. Patterson got the touchdown on the next play, a kick for extra point was good and East led 27-14. Burton showed his heels to West on the final scoring play of the game. On the first play after East took a punt, Burton blasted through a crack in the left side of his line and ran untouched for 68 yards.

Wiecek led West back with time running out with fine passing. Wiecek completed five of seven passes during the drive and hit a receiver in the hands with another effort.

The long gainer was a 31 yard screen pass to Bill Baker, a pass which Wiecek threw up for grabs while under great pressure from East linemen.

Wiecek fired a sharp pass on the next play, but it was right into the hands of East linebacker Mike Smalls.

## Orchard Ridge Wins Ice Hockey Opener

The Oakland Community College hockey team opened its 1971 Midwest College Hockey Association season with 5-3 victory over Hillsdale. OCC behind 3-1 at the start of the third period, scored four goals in an impressive comeback from behind victory.

Two Farmington residents, left wing Tim Audette and goalie Paul Thompson, figured prominently in the Raider-dominated third period. Audette, a 1967 graduate of Our Lady of Sorrows, returned to the hockey team after two years of military service, including a tour of duty in Vietnam. He started the OCC comeback at 10:32 of the final stanza, by scoring the team's second goal and closing the margin to 3-2.

He was also a member of the first hockey team formed at the Orchard Ridge Campus when it opened in 1967, but the Hillsdale game marked the first goal in Midwest College Hockey Association competition. Paul Thompson played goal on the 1969 Raider team and has also rejoined the squad after having completed military service. Thompson, a 1968 graduate of North Farmington High School, held the Hillsdale team scoreless after they tallied their third and final goal at 19:15 of the final period.

SIX MINUTES after Audette's goal, freshman Chuck Rossie tied the score at 3-3 with a slap shot into the upper corner of the net, beating Hillsdale goalie Pat Quinn cleanly.

The winning goal was scored one minute later, with freshman defenseman Lee Weltman out-manoeuvring Quinn. Rossie then put the game out of Hillsdale's reach with his second unassisted goal of the game with 2:49 remaining.

OCC outshot Hillsdale 38-34, but Hillsdale dominated the penalty statistics, being assessed a total of 16 minors and 42 minutes of penalty time. The Raiders were charged with six minors and collected a total of 22 penalty minutes due to a 10 minute misconduct.

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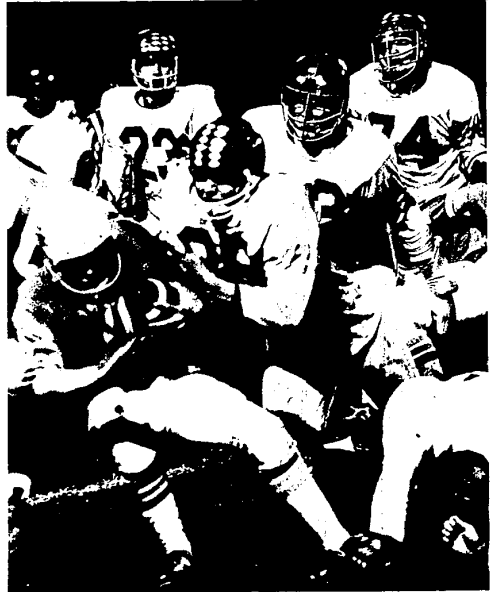
