

Council Commended On Bussing Stance

FARMINGTON THE LEAGUE commended the Farmington City Council for not issuing any statement concerning bussing, either pro or con, and for refraining, at this point, from taking a stand on the federal District Court findings that Detroit schools are segregated.

The letter of praise from the West Bloomfield-Farmington Area League of Women Voters was read at Monday night's meeting of the council.

The league said it supports efforts to prevent or remove discrimination in education, employment and housing and

to help communities bring about racial integration of their school systems.

The league wrote it cannot decide that bussing "is always good or always bad" but must look at the context of the particular situation and community. It wrote it was "pleased to find a group of officials leading in that direction, thereby exerting a calming influence on the community."

Although inference has included the suburban school districts, Smith added, the districts, in fact, are not part of legal proceedings at this time.

"It is unlikely that any one school district or group of school districts," Smith stated, "would be allowed by the judge to become a part of the present lawsuit at this time."

Smith said the Farmington Board of Education will keep informed of all facts, situations and procedures and does not intend to miss an opportunity to be represented when it should be. But, he quickly added, the board will not interfere when it would be unwise.

Also: probable effect of proposed incorporation and of alternative actions on cost and adequacy of services; probable increases in taxes in relation to benefits; financial ability of new city to provide services; general effect upon the entire community; and relationship of action to any established city, village, township, county or regional land use plan.
