Lemont will sing at the revival meeting of the Baptist church at Pontiac on Friday evening. He will be accompanied by Miss Alice Westfall.

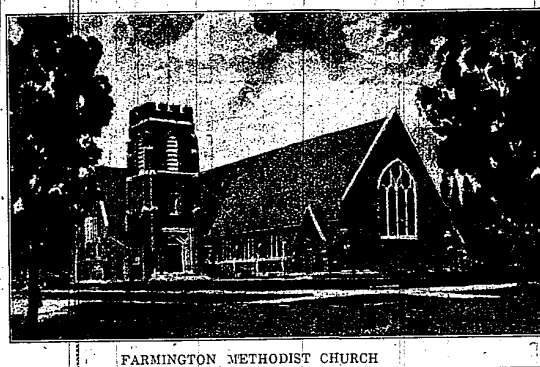

Why We Need An Attorney For Our Municipal Court

In former times it has not been of so great importance that justices be also attorneys-at-law, because the amounts involved in cases before them were not so large as today. Of late years, however, in order to relieve the higher courts of much litigation, the jurisdiction of the justice and municipal courts has been increased, and these justices now hear cases involving hundreds of dollars. They are no longer "small matters."

Under new statutes, the justice courts are also hearing cases involving a wider scope of crime.

Therefore it is of the greatest importance now that the justice hearing these cases have a **THOROUGH KNOWLEDGE OF THE LAW**. This is especially true in reference to appeals. An appealed case costs not only the litigants but the taxpayers of the County large sums of money.

Our present municipal judge, **JOHN J. SCHULTE, Jr.**, has had almost 100 appeals taken from his court, with **ONLY ONE REVERSAL**—and that in a jury case in which the point of reversal was one of fact rather than of law.

WE NEED AN ATTORNEY in our municipal court, both in justice to the parties in the cases tried and to avoid numerous appeals of cases, since appeals would be more probable if attorneys knew that the justice hearing the case had not had legal training. **WE WANT Judge John J. Schulte, Jr.**, to continue as our municipal judge because of his splendid record on the bench.
