

More Than 300 Attend Brilliant Minstrel Show At The Town Hall

An enthusiastic audience, of more than 300 people from Farmington and vicinity attended the benefit performance of the Old Time Minstrels, well known Detroit entertainers, and Ray Correll's Orchestra, under the auspices of Our Lady of Sorrows Church Tuesday night.

Farmington Town Hall was packed with the largest crowd there for years, as more than 100 performers brought back the spirit of the old-fashioned minstrel shows with a rendition of the best
