grades, and that the tuition obligation should be held as of equal importance with the payment of the district's own teaching staff.

Mr. Gleditsie said he could offer no general suggestion, but that he felt that "districts which owe Farmington should do what Farmington did several months ago," placing the teachers on part pay.

What would be left to the district by this saving should in all fairness be paid to Farmington for the tuition bills he said. This would equalize the load between teachers of the rural schools and Farmington teachers, whereas up to now the latter have been carrying the heavier burden.
