Shortly after 7:00 o'clock the Olin Russell, Inc. garage was asked to tow the wrecked car in, by Jack Kinsel; 20, of Redford, a newspaper delivery-man, who said he had been requested earlier by one of the men who had been in the car, to get a garage to haul the wrecked machine in as soon as possible. It was necessary to turn the car upright and lift the front end to bring it in. In the afternoon a tow-car from Lansing called for the vehicle. Soon after another tow-car came, also from Lansing, but the driver was told the wrecked auto was gone.

No report of the accident has been made either to Deputy Joseph DeVriendt of the Farmington Township booth, or to Chief of Police Lee Doy of Farmington. City it is reported that news of the accident was flashed on the State Police radio, however.
