The use of our service declined for the first time in more than thirty years. We did not cut down on service when business fell off. We kept it, right up to quality and we intend to keep it so. It would be a saving for us to run four days or three days a week, but we cannot stop-not for a minute. Electric service must be instantly available at all times. Too much depends on it. We have as many men on operative duty as we ever did, because we never had any surplus help. We did quit construction, as building or machinery jobs

became finished, and started only a few special jobs
We have always had faith in the future of the community we serve Through the World War the enormous demand for electricity had our designers busy trying to keep up. In no other city in the United States was the use of electricity increasing as rapidly as in Detroit in the past 30 years. Now in 1933 we have more plant than we need. Before the depression our judgment was good. We still believe that we will have to build new plants to keep up with the future of this community.
