U. S. SEED LOANS MADE AVAILABLE

Federal loans to farmers for the purchase of seed and for the cultivation of crops during the coming growing season are available to Oakland County growers, according to E. D. Bailey, County Agricultural Agent. Application may be made at once and the loans, if granted, should be available within about ten days.

The federal government has made available \$90,000,000 for loans to responsible farmers in order that they may plant their land and carry on through the coming season. As security for the loans, which are limited to a \$900.00 maximum, the government asks a chattel mortgage on the crops and expects repayment of the loans by October 31, 1938.

Last year 90 farmers in this county received loans and practically all have repaid their loans as agreed, Mr. Bailey states.

The loans may be used to purchase seed; for the purchase of animals used in cultivation; for fertilizer and for spray for fruit trees.

Certain regulations set up include: Payment of mortgage for production of a crop; lack of any other income; Planting of a garden for home use and of acreage to feed his livestock; money must not be used for purchase of machinery or payment on any debt.

Applications are made through the county agricultural agent at his office in the Post Office Building but are also by a committee appointed for this county being forwarded to Washington. Applicants must present with the request proper legal description of their land.
