MOVIE TO PLAY IN ANN ARBOR SEASON

Famous Stage Star Preferred To Appear in Henderson's Spring Festival

It was a long distance telephone call at 3 o'clock in the morning last week that brought the information to Robert Henderson, director of the Ann Arbor Dramatic Season, that Jane Cowl, leading star of the stage, had postponed for three weeks the motion picture she is to make in Hollywood in order that she might appear in his festival next month.

Through her New York representatives, Miss Cowl informed Henderson that she would be able to carry out her wish to appear in two classical productions with his company.

The Dramatic Festival will open on Monday evening, May 22, with "Another Language" starring Tom Powers and Edith Barrett. Mr. Powers has been playing in "Another Language" all this winter on its trans-continental tour. "Springtime for Henry" will be the second production, with Henry Hull, star of the New York performances of this light comedy, Violet Heming, Rose Hobart and Tom Powers.

On Thursday, June 1, Noel Coward's "Design for Living" will be open, and at the Wednesday matinee and evening performances, June 7, Jane Cowl and her co-star Rollo Peters will begin their engagement in Alexandre Dumas' famous romance "Camille." Miss Cowl and Mr. Peters are being reunited in a production again for the first time since their spectacular success together in "Romeo and Juliet."

Miss Cowl's second production, "Twelfth Night," will open Tuesday night, June 13, playing in repertory schedule throughout the Commencement weeks at the University of Michigan. Miss Cowl's

interpretation of Viola in "Twelfth Night" is said to be the finest performance of the role in this generation. Alternating with "Twelfth Night," Violet Kemble Cooper and Tom Powers will appear in "The Mad Hopes," in which Miss Cooper was starred this winter on Broadway. Miss Cooper has recently scored an outstanding success in the film "Our Betters," with Constance Bennett.

Rose Hobart, celebrated motion picture and stage star, who will be featured in the recent New York hit, "Springtime for Henry," was co-starred with Charles Farrell in "Lillian," with

Freddie March in "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde," with Charles Bickford in "East of Borneo," as well as many other important films.
