Rules Of City Softball League Are Announced

of May and June to be played each week.

7. Each game shall start promptly at 6:30 p. m. and consist of seven innings, and it shall be the duty of each captain to have his team on the field and ready to play at the designated starting time. Absence of players shall not be a valid reason for delaying play.

8. The following men shall be the umpires without pay: Ernest Ash, John Dalrymple, Harry Moore. All decisions of the umpires shall be final, and unappealable, and the umpires shall have the power to discipline players who make obnoxious disturbances in objecting to decisions by fining such offenders not more than 50 cents. Failure to pay any fine imposed by official umpires shall result in suspension of players involved.

9. Players may be traded from one team to another with the consent of three of the four captains, provided that no trade may be made after June 1st, and Captains may recruit players during the month of May to fill vacancies in their Roster with the consent in writing of two of the other three Captains.

10. The following shall be designated as official score keepers without pay: Robert Cook, Howard Tanner, Bill Pauline and each week shall publish the standing of each team in the league.

11. The league shall not be responsible for any injury or insult to either umpires, score keepers or players.

12. The public shall be welcome to attend all games without charge but the league shall not be responsible for any injury, broken windshields or any other damage incurred while in attendance at games.

13. The league officials shall assess each player pro rata sufficient sums to defray expenses of purchasing necessary balls, bats and bases.

14. Any extraordinary problems that shall arise which shall be beyond the wisdom ability or compatibility of the league officials to decide, shall be referred to the Justices of the Peace of Farmington City, sitting as a Supreme Tribunal for Grievances, whose rulings shall be final. The Supreme Tribunal shall function without pay.

15. In case of postponement of any game for cause determined by Umpire the Captains of the two teams involved shall determine the date of play off.

16. The foregoing rules shall be subject to change or amendment by written consent of three of the four Captains.

17. On July 1st the official score keepers shall designate the winner of the Championship and the winning team to be known as the Champs shall be guests of honor at a banquet given by the other three teams; the expense thereof to be contributed by these teams on the following basis: Team finishing second, 25c each; Team finishing third 50c each; Team finishing fourth 75c each.

The officials of the league to collect the funds and arrange for the Banquet to be held before July 15, 1933.

18. No scheduled game or play off of postponement shall be played on Sunday.

19. The following prizes, offered by the Farmington Merchants, shall be awarded for the following accomplishments during the official season: (a) Officially scored Home Runs, (1) Ice cream Sundae, any flavor, Stanley Smith; (2) 1 pint Ice Cream, any flavor, Jos. Himmelgspach; (3) Ice cream soda, Sugar Bowl. (b) Battering Championship, (c) Leading Pitcher.

20. In case a game is tied at end of seven innings, the game shall continue until a decision is reached or until called by the Umpire on account of darkness or rain in case the game shall be replayed, the date to be decided by Captains of the teams involved.
