I have however, been requested to find other employment by June 1, 1933. This, I have been unable to do, so far.

I deny any rumor or gossip that I am resigning as such an act would be absolutely silly during these times. I have a family to support and have responsibilities.

My salary has been reduced from \$1500 per month to \$600 per month during the past three and one-half years.

I feel that I have given the people of this city the best I possess and at all times I have tried to conduct my office in a fairminded and unprejudiced manner.

Unless I obtain other employment necessitating that I move elsewhere, I plan to live here and also continue in office until I am officially removed.

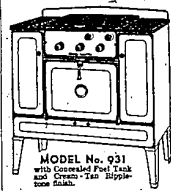

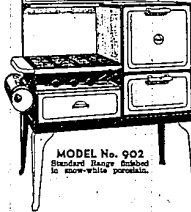

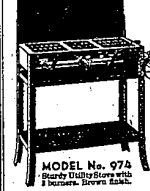
