MRS. IRA L. POWER

Died at the home of her granddaughter, Mrs. Grace Severance, June 10. Mrs. Ira L. Power was 93 years old.

She was the daughter of Samuel and Ann Bechtel and was born in West Bloomfield Township, May 8, 1840. She married Clinton Vreeland, February 16, 1858. Two children were born to this union, Mrs. Carrie De Crost of Grass Lake and William S. Vreeland of Walled Lake, both of whom are living. Left a widow in 1881, she married Ira L. Power of Farmington, in April 1893. He died December 21, 1907. In the course of her long and useful life she made many friends. Her genial way and her kindly disposition endeared her to all with whom she came in contact. Her parents were among the early pioneers of Michigan and she became fully acquainted with the hard ships and privations of the pioneer life. She lived in the days when the wooten abounded in game and when the ox cart was the principal method of transportation. She saw the Indian trails and bridle paths give way to dirt roads and saw them supplanted by our modern system of cement construction.

She was a kind and cheerful wife and devoted mother. Active, industrious, willing at all times to help those less fortunate than she. She brought comfort to the sick and aid to the needy. She was a true and consistent member of the Methodist church, and ever a humble follower of the great teacher. She had unflinching faith in the continuous existence of the soul. And now she has entered the land "whose gate ever swings inward."

Preliminary Allocation Of School Tax Is Made

Preliminary millage allocation for school taxation in Farmington and Commerce townships is announced in a report by County Clerk Lynn D. Allen.

The Farmington rate is as follows: The whole township, 4.3; District No. 1 fractional (German) 4.0; No. 2 (Nichols) 4.0; No. 3 fractional (Thayer) 4.0; No. 4 (Fairview) 4.0; No. 4 fractional (West Farmington) 4.5; No. 5 (Farmington) 6.5; City of Farmington 1; No. 5 fractional (Clarenceville) 5.7; No. 6 (Noble) 6.5; No. 6 fractional (Bond) 6.5.

The rate for Commerce township is 3.9. The district rates are: No. 1 fractional (Walled Lake Rural Agricultural) 6.5; No. 4 fractional (Stephens) 6.3; No. 5 fractional (Commerce-Union) 4.0; No. 7 fractional (Wicks) 4.2; No. 10 fractional (Commerce) 4.0.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 2:00 p. m. at the home with Rev. H. H. Savage of Pontiac officiating and interment at Richardson Cemetery.

7,259 Acres of Land Sold By State in May

Lansing—Sale of tax homestead lands held in May by the Lands Division of the Department of Conservation resulted in the disposal of 7,259 acres and 288 platted lots at a total sale price of \$10,565, the Division reported. Practically all of the receipts from the sale will be returned to the county, township and school district in which each description of land is located, the state retaining only its proportion of the tax equity, averaging ten per cent.

The sales held in May were in the form of public auctions at Gladwin, Gaylord, Escanaba, Manistee and White Cloud and were of lands for which applications had been filed by various interested individuals.
