FILM LOANS

Lansing—Since January 1, film loans made by the Educational Division of the Department of Conservation have increased 15 per cent over the same period in 1932.

During the first five months of this year the 16 reels of Michigan wild life and conservation pictures now included in the Department's library have been shown to 343,000 Michigan adults and school children, as compared with an attendance record of 292,000 from January to June, 1932.
