New Taxes Raise Gas

Levy To 4.75 Cents

With the enactment of the new state gasoline tax on July, the total amount of tax per gallon was raised to four and three-fourths cents. The state specific tax is three cents; the Federal tax, one and one-half cents (last half-cent added June 16); and the three-cent state sale tax, amounting to approximately one-fourth of a cent per gallon. In many states, the total amount of the tax will exceed the price of the gasoline itself.
