Band Notes

Probably no instrument is as popular with the masses of the public as a saxophone. No instrument receives more criticism from the general public either. But the lowly saxophone proceeds with its following nevertheless. Keeping a saxophone in tune is the player's most difficult job. One saxophone out of tune in a band will cause the whole organization to sound untuned.

There are so many sizes of saxophones that few understand their uses. The small B flat soprano is a high pitched instrument and plays a part similar to the solo cornet. The band has no soprano saxophone although Gerald Grace learned to play on one and still possesses it. He now plays an E flat alto Saxophone along with Charles Collins and Edwin Aldrich. The C melody saxophone is much desired by some for it can play from piano music. Many dislike its tone and although it is handy for home playing it is worthless in orchestra or band work. Its parts are not outstanding if it has any written. The B flat tenor saxophone is very important as it carries a very pleasing fill-in part and also much fluent bass solo work. Virginia Hibern and Arlene Oldham play tenor saxophones and both are becoming well tried at the task. Virginia has had the longer experience but they make a team that is able to support their portion of the responsibility. Another saxophone that is important for it supports the bass section of the saxophones is the E flat Baritone Sax. This instrument substitutes for the sometimes forgotten Bassoon that every good band needs. We have no bassoon as much as we should like one. Hence our baritone sax has to help to cover our deficiency in that respect. Dorothea McCully plays this horn and although at times we wonder if the horn is carrying her or she is carrying the horn, they both go along together. This section as a whole adds a fullness of orchestral quality to a band that one needs as well as to fulfill the functions hereto mentioned.

Among the new telephones installed recently in Farmington by the Bell Telephone Company was one for Howard McCarthy's garage at 1328 Grand River. The number is 667-31.

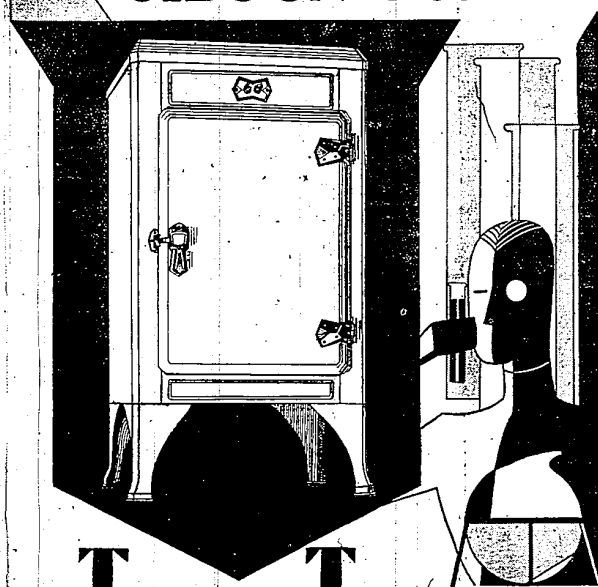
