### Harmony Prevails At Annual School Meetings

(Continued from page one)  
 The school bus in Fierston District failed to appear, and the annual meeting passed off very quietly. A petition had been circulated prior to the meeting, and was signed by 63 citizens, asking that the school bus be operated next year. Finance of the district had led the board to decide against continuance of the bus, and the situation was outlined to the electors present before polls were opened for election of trustees. It was pointed out that continuance of the bus would necessitate elimination of other expense, and would mean that one more teacher would have to be dropped. Any agitation that might have been expected was silenced following this explanation, since no one arose to espouse the bus-operation cause.

Two board members whose terms expired were re-elected without opposition. Of 27 votes cast, John Harlan received 22 for re-election and Albert Nacker 21. Others were scattered.

At Clarenceville, Mrs. Fred Lare and S. Utjian were re-elected to the board. After some discussion, the length of the school term was left to the judgment of the board. The tuition rate of \$60 was voted and the district decided to discontinue free text-books. The board met immediately after the election and selected their officers. The slate named were: President, Walter Headerle; Secretary, Fred Lare; Treasurer, S. Utjian; Trustees, J. H. Sauve and Elmer Donahy.

Miss Martha Noble and Charles Erwin were unanimously elected to the board at the Noble district meeting. A nine-month school term was voted. The \$60 rate for high school tuition was approved.

Despite the fact that he asked to be removed, Bert Welfare was renamed to the Walled Lake board. He has been a member of the board for 12 years. Two candidates were run against the incumbent but he won by a few votes. William Glover was elected to succeed M. L. Bradley.

Bond school district placed Archie Leonard on the board at its meeting to succeed James Tolman. The voters decided to have ninth grade material taught at the district school and that the district should pay the \$60 rate for pupils of the tenth grade and above.

At Novi district No. 1, Earl Banks became moderator of the school board as a result of the Monday election, succeeding Edward Seely. A discussion arose on the question of whether the children should be sent to the Novi school or to Farmington. The matter was finally left to the board for a decision.

Fairview re-elected Thomas Gibson to the board, Novi No. 2 re-elected both William Mairs and J. O. Munro.

### One Killed, Three Are Hurt In Wixom Crash

One person was killed and three were injured in an auto accident Saturday night at Wixom.

The crash occurred when Julius Richards of Detroit lost control of his car on the Wixom-Pontiac Road and ran it into a tree. Richards' back was broken and he died instantly. The injured were: William Richards, grandson of the deceased, cuts about the face; Victor Sanor, possible concussion of the brain; and Bernard Sanor, cuts on both legs. All of the injured persons were from Detroit. They were taken to the Redford branch of Receiving Hospital.


