

## Annual School Report

## SCHOOL DISTRICT No. 5 CITY AND TOWNSHIP OF FARMINGTON

The Annual Meeting of School District No. 5 City and Township of Farmington was held June 12, 1933 in the High School building.

The meeting was called to order by A. L. Ross, president, at 8 p. m. Minutes of last annual meeting read and accepted. A financial report of the district was read.

Floyd Nichols, Mrs. Emory Hatton and J. A. Dalrymple were appointed as tellers. The President called for nominations to fill the vacancy caused by the expiration of the term of Arthur Lamb. N. H. Power nominated Arthur Lamb. A motion was made by Howard Warner, supported by Floyd Nichols, that the nominations be closed and the Secretary instructed to cast a unanimous ballot for Arthur Lamb. Motion carried. Floyd Nichols announced the result of the ballot and declared Arthur Lamb elected to the office of school trustee for a term of three years.

The President called for nominations to fill the vacancy of A. L. Ross. Dr. Z. R. Aschenbrenner was nominated by Floyd Nichols, nomination supported by Arthur Lamb. Miss Helen Hard nominated Lloyd Gullen. The president declared the nominations closed and called for the ballot. The result of the closed and called for the ballot. Total votes cast, 38. Dr. Z. R. Aschenbrenner 28, Lloyd Gullen, 10. Dr. Aschenbrenner was declared elected to the office of school trustee for a term of three years.

A motion was made by Howard Warner, supported by Edgar Pierce, that meeting adjourn. Motion carried and meeting adjourned.

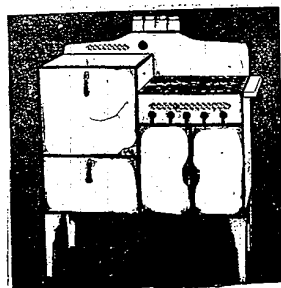
