#### Is the First Woman to Handle President's Calls

For the first time in the history of the White House, a woman will handle a President's personal telephone calls. Miss Louise Hachmeister, a former operator for the New York Telephone Company, became chief telephone operator for the Democratic national campaign committee early in 1932, taking charge of the immense amount of traffic handled over the specially installed switchboards and other telephone facilities placed at campaign headquarters in New York. So shy did she acquit herself that she has been appointed to operate the private branch switchboard in the White House, where picture shows her.

#### Facts About the Telephone

About 92 per cent of the 32,500,000 telephones in the world can be connected with the Bell System telephone.

At the beginning of 1933 there were more than 4,300,000 miles of telephone wire in service in the State of New Jersey.

More than 60 per cent of the approximately 700,000 owners of American Telephone and Telegraph Company stock hold ten shares or less.

In Belgium, subscribers to telephone service may now pay their advance charges on a quarterly basis instead of annually as heretofore.
