BRILLIANT VICTORY, DEFEAT END LEGION BASEBALL SEASON

Saturday Game Goes Into Extra Innings; Plymouth Outslugs Farmington in Windup

Farmington's team in the 17th district Legion league ended the season with a brilliant victory and a defeat in the week end contests.

The game with Hazel Park on Saturday was the best one in which the boys had participated all season. It was very much of a pitchers' battle and lasted 12 innings before the Farmington lads broke through to take a 3-2 decision. Charlie Ash, who did the hurling for Farmington, stayed through the 10th inning and was relieved by Lawrence Way when the heat got the better of him. Farmington got 13 hits to 10 for the Hazel Park aggregation. The game was played on the school grounds in Farmington. Sunday's nightmare came as an anti-climax. Farmington losing 21-11. The battle was staged at Riverside Park in Plymouth. The early innings went by peacefully. Plymouth got four runs in the second but Farmington came right back to push across three. Lawrence Way, who was doing the pitching for Farmington, got into one hole after another but managed to slip out of each. The sacks were crowded and, in one inning, there were two on and no outs. In each case, the pitcher was the trouble. Mostly the fault of the fielders who booted away several easy advances. Chuck Lee saved the game in the fifth inning when he made one-handed stab of a hard-hit liner with the bases packed and two out. That particular sock had "hit" written all over it.

Came the sixth and went Pitcher Way. Lawrence seemed suddenly to lose everything he had and the movements of the Plymouth batsmen around the sacks looked like the American Legion parade at the Detroit convention. Coach Carl Goers removed Way from the debris and sent Mitchell to the mound. The inning ended with the count at 10-5. Plymouth, Mitchell seemed easy for the enemy to look at and more runs came streaming across the plate. Lefty Waddell took his place in the ninth, coming to the mound from first.

With the game hopelessly lost in the ninth, the boys broke through the Plymouth pitching to register six runs after scoring two in the eighth.

The record of the Farmington team during the season was not enviable but it must be remembered that this is the first time that Farmington has had a Legion team. Athletic Advisor Norman Lee and Coach Goers have had to do a lot of experimenting at the cost of many games. They have, uncovered some good material and Coach Goers believes that they will be "up there" when next season comes around. Lefty Waddell was probably the best first baseman in the league and both Charlie Ash and Lawrence Way show promise as pitchers. Wagner has proved a top-rate catcher and a good hitter.

Royal Oak won ten straight games to take the title. Farmington came closer to beating them than any other team in the league. In the opening game of the season, Royal Oak defeated Farmington on the school grounds by a score of 15-14.

Motor Vehicle Responsibility

Lansing—Michigan's new motor vehicle operators' "financial responsibility" law is not a compulsory insurance law but it is intended to restrain careless, irresponsible drivers who have no regard for the safety of other highway users. Upon receipt of certification that a judgment of \$300 or more has not been satisfied, the Secretary of State, under the law, is required to suspend the operator's license and use of license plates. These can only be reinstated by furnishing proof that the judgment has been met and by establishing future financial responsibility up to \$10,000 in case of two deaths from traffic accidents and \$1,000 responsibility for property damage. This responsibility can be established in four ways, by depositing \$10,000 with the state treasurer; by adequate motor liability insurance; by surety bond; or by a personal bond with two sureties who each own sufficient Michigan property to meet the bond.

9,000 Men Employed In State C. C. C. Camps

Lansing—Nine thousand young men living in 45 camps in the northern part of the state have settled down to a six months routine of carrying on the President's Emergency Conservation Work program.

In most places the camps themselves have been converted into semi-permanent structures. Work plans have been organized and forestry work is now in full swing.

The amount of work that is being done has more than fulfilled expectations in the opinion of L. R. Schoenmann, Michigan Conservation Department, coordinator of the 45 camps working on state projects, and who has just completed an inspection of several of the camps in both the upper and lower peninsulas.
