WALLED LAKE BOY HIT BY AUTOMOBILE; DIES OF INJURIES

Norman John Vickery Struck While Riding Bicycle; Funeral On Tuesday

Norman John Vickery, nine year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Vickery of Walled Lake, died early Sunday from injuries sustained Saturday night when a bicycle he was riding was struck by an automobile at the intersection of Maple and Young Roads. The driver of the car was O. D. Griffin of Detroit.

Vickery was crossing Maple road on Young road at the time of the accident. Griffin swerved to the left to avoid hitting him but knocked the boy and his bicycle into a ditch. The car left the road and fell into the ditch on top of the boy. First aid was administered by a Walled Lake physician and the boy was then rushed to General Hospital at Pontiac by Deputy Wiley Coe. Death was caused by a fractured skull.

The body was taken to the funeral home of Coroner J. Lee Voorhees and was removed to the residence Monday. Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at the home and burial was made in Walled Lake cemetery.

Besides his parents, the boy is survived by two brothers, Floyd and Donald, and two sisters, Freda and Rena, all living at home. He was born in Detroit and had lived with his parents at Walled Lake for six years. He attended the Walled Lake school.


