

FORD V-8 PARADE GOES THROUGH CITY CAR ON LONG RUN

Trial Successful So Far, Drivers Report; Car Goes Through Farmington Twice Daily

A parade of 75 Ford V-8 stock cars led by the blue and white which is making a 1000-mile economy run over the state roads, passed through Farmington, Saturday morning. The car passed through Farmington each morning during the run at 8:40 on its way out from Detroit; and again each night at 9:42 on the return trip.

The test is being made to show the people of the state how economically the V-8 may be run with Mobilgas and Climatic Control. The car covers a 400-mile route, visiting Lansing, Grand Rapids, Kalamazoo, and Jackson. It will be put through the equivalent of the average driver's yearly mileage of about 14 days.

The parade accompanied the car only on the initial run. At that time, it was met by the mayor, police escorts and newspapermen of the town on its route. Two cities welcomed the parade with brass bands.

The car is being operated by drivers in three shifts, and their reports indicate that it is running smoothly and is in perfect condition. At each 1000 mile interval when the oil has been changed, the crankcase has been found full and the lubricant in good condition.

(Continued from page one) Their deposits being used to offset the amount of the church mortgage. Under this plan, the church members could contribute much more to the church than if they waited for their partial dividends and contributed in cash later.

The settlement is also advantageous to the bank for it removes a large part of the claims against the institution and thus reduces the size of the dividend payments. The task of collecting the interest and principal on the bonds over a period of years is also avoided.

Final settlement of the mortgage makes a notable achievement for Rev. Palmer who has completed nearly eight years in the Farmington pastorate. His work in the parish has attracted considerable attention in Baptist circles in the state and he was elected president of the Detroit Baptist Ministerial Conference for the present year in May. Previous to that time, he served as vice-president of the conference.

(Continued from page one) hours has occurred among the food stores. The A. and P. and Kroger stores have adopted similar new hours, opening at 8:00 o'clock in the morning instead of the previous time of 7:30, and closing at 6:00 p. m., the former hour having been 5:30. On Saturdays the hours will be 8:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m., whereas formerly the stores kept open until 10:30 p. m.

Cities 'Trend Of Times' It is contended on behalf of this policy that its fully in accord not only with the NRA code of shorter working hours for all workers; but also in tune with the modern trend of recent decades toward reduced hours for everyone; that advances in every field should make possible greater leisure for all who work. It is asserted in this regard that the retail store clerk is among the few who have not, until now, benefited from man's advancement. It has stated that the 10:30 p. m. closing hour Saturday nights has meant for grocery employees that often they do not get home until long after midnight Saturday nights.

On the opposite side, Delos

Hamlin, proprietor of the Red and White store, has refused to meet the closing hours of the other two stores, and is continuing his store hours as before. He asserted that to shorten the store hours is a violation of the code, insofar as re-employment is one of the main objects of the NRA movement. Mr. Hamlin declared flatly that he would not cut down on his store hours regardless of any agreement that might be made or anything that might be done by others.

Judge Schulte will notify the merchants of the meeting time in a few days. A brief canvass of a number of retail store owners indicates that they will participate in the meeting and abide by any agreement reached there.

The Schulte and Pure office announced hours from 8:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. henceforth, as compared with 7:30 a. m. to 6:00 p. m. formerly.

The N. R. A. drive has gone ahead into full swing in Farmington during the past week. The number of blue eagles in store windows has been augmented by several additions and many more of the dealers are planning to join during the coming week.


