MERC Denies Apology Request

FARMINGTON
A state trial examiner has denied the Farmington School District's request for dismissal of an unfair labor practice charge brought by the Farmington Education Assn. (FEA).

He also refused a petition for a bill of particulars.

Joseph B. Bialek, examiner for the Michigan Employment Relations Commission, dismissed the board's plea for compensatory damages and a public apology for disparaging statements made by the FEA about the board's negotiating team.

The FEA had charged that board negotiators lacked necessary authority to bargain in good faith.

The board has sought detailing of alleged wrongdoings to clarify FEA accusations. LeRoy Bartman, the

board's chief negotiator, described these charges as "vague and lacking in specifics."

Hearing on the FEA charge is scheduled for Nov. 29. Meanwhile, state fact-finding into the stalled teacher contract negotiations is due to begin Nov. 23.

The teachers have been working under an extension of last year's pact since classes started in September. Only block to settlement of a new contract are wage terms for the second year of a two-year agreement.

Vagnozzi Denied Bid For Accuser's Records

FARMINGTON
District Judge Dunbar Davis of Plymouth has denied a defense request for the history of any psychiatric treatment undergone by Mrs. Mary Kenney in her assault and battery case against Farmington School Board Trustee Aldo Vagnozzi.

The case will go to trial at a date still to be determined. Defense counsel Jack Bain sought to have the judge order Paul H. Bibeau, Farmington Township attorney, to produce records of any psychiatric or psychological treatment furnished Mrs. Kenney over the past eight years, saying such reports might reflect on her credibility.

"I didn't just dream up this motion out of thin air, you know," Bain said.

BUT JUDGE Davis, in a special evening session Monday at Plymouth, denied the motion, saying it appeared the prosecutor lacked such records in his possession or under his control and that the judge lacked authority to compel Mrs. Kenney to furnish them.

"I did have, I'm not sure I would," Judge Davis added.

He agreed that Vagnozzi had the right to have psychiatrists in court during the trial to observe Mrs. Kenney and to testify and added: "To me this seems the proper way to bring the matter before the court."

Vagnozzi also appeared at the evening session for re-arraignment on the charge. He again stood mute and a plea of innocent was entered for him.

The re-arraignment resulted from an earlier court challenge by Bain of Mrs. Kenney's original complaint. The judge at that time, to correct any possibility of error, reheard her complaint and reaffirmed it.

MRS. KENNEY charged that Vagnozzi physically assaulted her as she sought signatures on recall petitions against Vagnozzi and two other trustees who had voted in favor of sex education in the schools. Mrs. Kenney's husband, Donald, led the now defunct recall drive.

Kerastas Will March On TV

Theme of the band's show, which will be televised by NBC, but blacked out in this area, will be "Entertainment of Our Time." The highlight will be appearance of Winnie-the-Pooh and friends performing a dance routine to "House at Pooh Corner" and "Talk to the Animals."

The show will mark the third time the MSU band has performed before a nationally televised audience this season. The band is directed by Kenneth Bloomquist and David Catron.

Hottum Held For Robbery

Michael G. Hottum, 21, of 24843 Ivywood, Farmington, is being held in lieu of \$20,000 bond in the armed robbery of Romano's Pizzeria, 23900 Nine Mile, Southfield.

Hottum was identified by witnesses from photographs, police said, as one of two men who got away with about \$500 last Sunday night after herding the restaurant owner and three employees into a back room at gunpoint.

Pretrial examination is set for Monday in Southfield District Court.
