FRUIT GROWERS TO VISIT FARMINGTON AREA ORCHARDS

Four fruit farms in the Farmington area will be visited on a county tour by fruit growers on Tuesday. Demonstrations of new methods in fruit growing will be held at each farm.

The first farm to be visited on the tour will be that of Will Flint, one mile north of Novi on the 2-mile road. At this farm, the growers will see an example of an orchard irrigated by the porous hose method. The next farm on the morning schedule will be that of the Gimmier brothers, 13-mile and Halstead roads. The pruning of a mature peach orchard will be demonstrated on this farm.

From the Gimmier farm, the party will proceed one mile to the north to the orchard of Charles Helsted. The use of home-made traps made out of corrugated paper in combating the carpet moths on the apple crop will be demonstrated.

At noon, the tour will reach the Doc Button farm on the 2-mile road. Basket lunch will be held on the Button lawn. After the lunch, two softball teams captained by Charles Button and Franklin Sherman will play a game. A program will follow. H. A. Gardinell of Michigan State college will speak on the outlook for the fruit crop. Frank Sherman will give a summary of results of various spraying methods used in southern Michigan during the past five years in the war against the codling moth. The tour is being directed by K. D. Bailey, county agricultural agent.

Large Winery Plans To Locate At Junction

(Continued from page one) now being used in their Walkerville winery, are the finest in the country for wine, and much superior to the famed California grapes.

It is estimated that \$25,000 worth of sugar would be used yearly in the Farmington plant. All Farmington labor would be employed except the chemist and the manager of the plant, it was asserted.

Co-operation Given
The report received Thursday was made by Smith, Hinchman, and Grylls, prominent Detroit firm of architects. Mr. Twomey expressed the hope that even more than \$15,000 could be saved by using the Farmington structure instead of erecting a new building. The Walkerville men look favorably upon this Farmington location aside from the advantage of the buildings now standing and available, although first attracted here by that factor. They expressed high appreciation of the friendly attitude and active co-operation of Farmington City officials, who have been working quietly but energetically to aid the project since the Walkerville men first called on Tuesday of last week.

Mr. Tamm and Mr. Healy have been discussing with Thomas Beath, in charge of the property for Eastern Michigan System, terms under which the site could be obtained.

NICHOLS REUNION

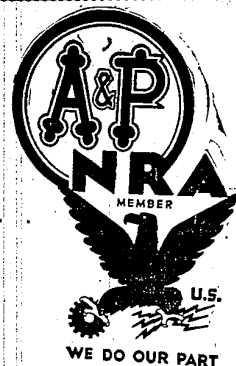
