**WALLED LAKE SCHOOL  
WILL OPEN, SEPT.  
11; TAYLOR HEAD**

The Walled Lake Consolidated School will open Monday, September 11, the board of Education has decided.

By recent action of the board, textbooks will be sold at the school at cost in an attempt to make the cost of education as little as possible and to permit individual pupils to be better supplied with books and equipment. The school will be open September 7, 8, and 9 from 8 a. m. until noon and from 1 to 5 p. m. in order that those wishing to buy school books and supplies may secure them before school begins and avoid the waste of time that accompanies unequipped pupils.

Some effort will be made to take care of post-graduate pupils if there are enough to make the effort worth while. Graduates who wish to continue their studies at Walled Lake are urged to confer with William Taylor, who may be found at the school building during school hours of most days on and after Aug. 30. Non-resident graduates may have their tuition paid by their local districts under the same conditions as before graduation until they reach the age of 21 according to Paul Thompson of the State Department of Public Instruction.

As it has been necessary to reduce the budget still lower than previous economies placed it, the per capita cost has been lowered and the board of education has set the high school tuition rate at \$60 for the coming year. This comes within the amount required to be paid by the local district and leaves nothing to be paid by the individual provided he has complied with the requirements of the law.

A faculty meeting will be held in the high school assembly room Saturday, September 9, at 2 p. m. Two new teachers besides Superintendent Taylor will meet the staff at this time. Their election has not yet been announced by the board.

As school is opening rather late for football, Coach Hursh plans to hold some preliminary practice after Labor Day and asks all candidates to be ready for the call. Many vacancies were left by graduation and ambitious underclassmen will have the opportunity to try for regular positions.

**DANIEL A. DUFFEE,  
FORMER RESIDENT  
OF NOVI, IS DEAD**

Daniel A. Duffee, a native of Novi, died Thursday, August 17, in Detroit, shortly after he collapsed at the Baker street car barns. He had been employed as a motorman on the Port Street street-car lines for the past 25 years. Mr. Duffee was 72 years old. Funeral services were conducted at the home Sunday and the burial was at Oakwood cemetery.

For 35 years Mr. Duffee operated a farm near Novi. He then worked for the D. U. R. for the Detroit United Railways for 20 years, after which he was employed for eight years as a watchman at the D. S. R. car barns.

He is survived by the widow, Lucie, and a son, Allen. Mrs. Duffee was born in Farmington, received her education in the city and later worked as a clerk in Fred Warner's dry goods store. The Duffee family lives at 2199 Lansing Avenue, Detroit.

Mr. Wiland was born in Farmington and taught in the schools of the city and township for six years. The depletion which time has wrought in the ranks of the 22nd Michigan was evident at the Thursday meeting. Only six of the boys who answered the call to the colors that September day of 1862 were present. Mr. Bogart at 93, was the oldest of the six. The old cowboy, lung at each of the reunions, was not in evidence. It was left at Bogart's home. The bell was stolen from the neck of a cow on the day the regiment was assembled and was rung on every battlefield where the regiment fought.

The regimental colors are now in a glass case at the state capitol.

**Sheriff's Officers Raid  
Township Restaurant**

The beer license of "Wag's Place," one half mile west of the Farmington city limits on Grand River will probably be revoked as the result of a raid made Wednesday night by sheriff's officers led by Sheriff Roy Reynolds. Juel B. Wagoner, proprietor of the inn, was arrested on a liquor law violation charge and arraigned in Pontiac Municipal court Thursday.

Deputies said that they seized a quantity of whiskey and gin in the Wagoner establishment. Reynolds said that the money used to make a "buy" in the place was found in Wagoner's pocket when he was searched at the County Jail. The beer license of the place was granted to Homer Norris, who sold the business to Wagoner. Sheriff Reynolds confiscated the license and made preparations on Thursday to recommend the revocation of the beer selling privilege by the Liquor Control Commission.
