## Dr. Grace Is Central Figure At Fair Exhibit

(Continued from page one). friends by long-distance without charge and have been assisted by Dr. Grace in getting their calls placed somewhat more quickly than most visitors, the demands on the service being enormous.

**Acoustical Illusion**  
The acoustical illusion device is so arranged that persons sitting in a mezzanine balcony facing a glass-enclosed stage hear the sounds made on the stage as if they were sitting on the stage themselves. The entertainment on the stage is a mixture of seriousness and humor during the course of which listeners are given sudden surprises. On the glass-enclosed stage is Oscar, the dummy with microphonic ears. Oscar's right ear connected with the head receiver on the right, each pair of headphones and his left ear is correspondingly associated with the left head receiver. Whatever those ears of Oscar hear, the visitor hears with such fidelity that he cannot escape the illusion of being in Oscar's place. When a curtain is drawn hiding Oscar and his associates on the stage, the effect is eerie. The visitor sitting quietly and holding the receivers tightly to his ear, is aware of footsteps seemingly approaching him and voices calling to him from different directions and whispering in his ear.

**Seeing Speech**  
Seeing speech is another novel experience to many Fair visitors. By an adaptation of telephone apparatus they are able to see the wave forms of speech while they hear it. A special telephone receiver was built for this device in which the diaphragm carries a small mirror. As the telephone currents set the diaphragm into rapid and complicated vibration, the mirror is set into a corresponding motion. A narrow beam of light directed into this mirror and reflected from it. When speech currents are coming over the line the mirror does not vibrate and where the reflected beam falls there is merely a spot of light. When speech currents are strong, the beam flashes up and down, vibrating faster the higher the musical pitch of the voice recorded. If the speech is loud, the vibration is of greater amplitude and the beam has a larger up-and-down movement.

**Inverted Speech**  
Other demonstrations include that of inverted speech and multi-channel telegraphy. In the former process, the words of the speaker are inverted when they enter the wire and are reinverted back to their original form only when they reach the other end of the wire. Thus, eavesdroppers hear only a meaningless jargon. By the use of multi-channel telegraphy, 12 messages may be heard over the same phone. The person who picks up the receiver hears the confused mixture of sounds and then, by turning switches, connects the line to the filtering equipment which sorts them out and allows him to listen to each of the 12 messages separately.

**Fair Drama**  
Humor and tragedy are freely intermingled in the great dramatic procession at the telephone exhibit. In the "long distance call" section, the eavesdroppers suffered a shock one day when a Japanese importer calling a friend in Los Angeles and spoke in his native tongue. Afterward, he was introduced to Dr. Grace. His first question was: "How soon shall we be able to talk to Japan?" There was one case of a 15-year old Cleveland boy who came to the Fair and ran out of funds. He called his mother on the long distance phone and, after a mild scolding, she told him she would send the rail fare home. The most tragic episode reported was that of a young fellow who had heard from his sweetheart in a long time. A call to her home in a western city revealed while his letters had not been answered.

## 2 PUBLIC SCHOOLS AT CLARENCEVILLE OPEN ON SEPT. 5

The Clarenceville schools will open next Tuesday, September 5, and one change will be made in the faculty. Miss Etha Smith of Ovid replacing Mrs. Catherine O'Neil, who resigned during the summer. M. J. Bleser will again be in charge. Among the important changes which will go into effect with the opening of the schools, are the abandonment of text books and the re-arrangement of the grades. Pupils will be required to purchase their own books, the school selling the books now on hand as second-hand texts. New text books will be sold by the district, the sale price to be just enough above the wholesale cost to cover insurance, postage, etc. Under the new grades arrangement, Grade 1-6 will be taught in both the Edgewood and the Clarenceville schools. Grades 7-10 will be in the Clarenceville school. It is planned to have all parents on the east side of Grand River send their children to the Edgewood school and those on the west side to the Clarenceville school. A few of the pupils living west of Grand River may later be transferred to the Edgewood school.

## Farmington's 1st Auction Sale Closes On Saturday

Farmington's first store auction sale, which has proved to be the most popular mercantile event held in the city in years, will close Saturday night at the Farmington Hardware.

It is expected that the store will have disposed of its entire furniture stock by that time. 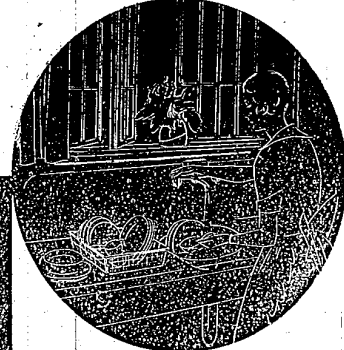
