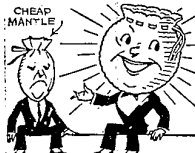


TELEPHONE SERVICE IS FASTER, FIGURES SHOW

WEEK END CRASHES NEAR FARMINGTON KILL 1, INJURE 4

An attempt is being made by the authorities to place the cause of an automobile accident which occurred last Sunday afternoon in which one man was killed and another seriously injured.

The accident in which Downey was killed took place at the Grand River cut-off and Gill road about 2:30 p. m. Sunday. According to Deputy Sheriff Joseph DeVries, Downey was proceeding east on the cut-off and pulled out of line. As he swerved to get back in line he was struck by the car driven by Bricker, which, it is reported, was travelling at a high rate of speed.

Farhood, according to a police report, was driving on the wrong side of Eight Mile Road and collided with Granet near the Delaware intersection. Both were treated for cuts and bruises at the Redford Hospital. The accident occurred about 8:00 a. m. Monday.

Gianus was a passenger in the car driven by Archie Marsh of 217 Center, Northville. Marsh attempted to make a left-hand turn off Grand River and was struck by a car driven by Charles Palmer, 224 1/2 Park, Detroit. Gianus is in the Redford Hospital where it is reported that he may lose one eye. His condition is serious.

A three-month note seems to reach maturity in no time at all.

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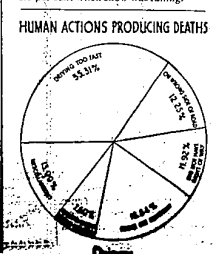
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The average speed of connection of long distance calls for 1932 was two minutes, as compared with 2.2 minutes in 1931 and 2.7 minutes in 1930. The per cent of calls on which the customer holds the line until the connection is completed or a definite report made, was 85 per cent, as compared with 80 per cent in 1931 and 75 per cent in 1930.

Long Cable is Completed. Most important in the construction program of the year was the completion of the last link of the St. Louis-Dallas cable, thereby making available Long Lines cable facilities all the way from Bangor, Me., to Cisco, Tex., a distance of approximately 2,450 miles.

THE SCOPE AND PURPOSE OF THE PRESIDENT'S EMERGENCY RE-EMPLOYMENT CAMPAIGN

The President's Emergency Re-employment Campaign may be described briefly as a plan to add from 5,000,000 to 8,000,000 persons to the nation's payroll within the next six weeks or so, through agreements made with the President of the United States by some 5,000,000 concerns or individuals, employing two or more persons each.

It is to be understood that this plan is supplementary to the plan of code adoption by various industrial and trade groups which has for its purpose the elimination of unfair competition, the establishment of more equitable rewards for labor, the spread of employment and the control of production.

The local committee is made up of the active heads of the leading business and civic organizations, and includes also the mayor. These thousands of cities and towns throughout the country were formed following telegrams and letters sent by General Johnson to the presidents of Chambers of Commerce or similar trade bodies in every section of the United States.

Each of these three colorates has seven or more majors on its staff, and each major has about the same number of captains. Each captain has seven or more field workers. All of the local organizations are, of course, constantly supplied with educational and inspirational material of all kinds from the National Recovery Administration in Washington.

The N.R.A. emblem, known popularly as the Blue Eagle, is one of the most interesting and vital features of the campaign. All employers who sign the President's Agreement are entitled to display the Blue Eagle with the initials N.R.A. and the words "We Do Our Part".

Every phase of the progress of this mighty campaign will be flashed in the newspapers of the country and announced constantly over the radio. In this way everyone will be in a position to know just what the campaign is doing from day to day in actually putting people back on the payrolls and adding to the mass purchasing power of the country.

With some minor exceptions, the terms of the President's Agreement with employers is, briefly, as follows: Any employer of a factory or mechanical worker or artisan must not pay him less than 40 cents an hour or work him more than 35 hours a week, except that if the employer were paying less than 40 cents for that kind of work on July 15 the employer can pay that rate now, but not less than 30 cents an hour.
