TWO INCENDIARY BLAZES CALL OUT FIRE DEPARTMENT

Puzzling circumstances surrounded two fires, both showing signs of incendiary origin, which occupied the attention of Farmington Fire Department during the past week.

The first, a grass fire along the boundaries of the C. F. Smith estate west of Farmington, started simultaneously in five places over a front of a quarter of a mile. Nothing could be found to offer a clue as to who set the fire or the reason for doing so. The blaze was not far from the old Reinas farmhouse on the estate near the Nine Mile Road, but no damage was done to buildings. The fire occurred Friday of last week.

A farmhouse, small building and haystack were burned in a fire at Tuck and Eight Mile Roads Tuesday afternoon. The house, which was vacant, was owned by a Novi resident. The flames started in the haystack, and firemen could do nothing to save the buildings. Shingles used as siding on the structure caused the heat to be unusually intense.

COLLAR BONE FRACTURE
The most serious accident that the Farmington Grid team have witnessed so far this year, occurred on Wednesday of this week. Jack Kerr suffered a fractured collarbone in a scrimmage game on the Farmington athletic field. Several of the boys have had bruises and Chuck Lee is nursing an injured hand. Big Bridge Necessitates Cutting Telephone Cables at Bottom of Bay



Telephone conversation between diver and telephone construction supervisor played an important part in maintaining subscribers' service as twelve telephone cables 100 feet below the surface of San Francisco Bay were cut preparatory to moving them from the path of the huge new San Francisco-East Bay bridge. Alone, 100 feet under water at the bottom of San Francisco bay, in lanky black darkness, a man recently carried on an unusual undertaking. His knee on an iron saw horse, a hack saw in his hand, and surrounded by a dozen tools of all kinds, he saved away at a huge 1200-wire telephone cable.

Talks Constantly With Barge Above
Through the muddy water, he could not see his hand before his face. With diving suit, his weight was 370 pounds. Yet for an hour and a half he saved and hammered, pulled and cut and dug, fastened ropes, and washed away mud with a stream of water from a nozzle and hose under 100 pounds pressure.

And all the while he carried on an almost constant conversation by telephone with his chief at the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company on the company's barge 100 feet above him. Other men protected his air supply and manipulated ropes running down to him, and shifted steel lines and electrical cords and cables at his direction.

Cuts Four-Inch Cable
All this that the way might be cleared for the \$75,000,000 San Francisco-East Bay bridge. The bridge needs the exact route which telephone cables have occupied for nearly a half century. And from the first they cable laid in 1884, with 14 wires serving about 300,000 bay people, has grown to the present twelve mighty cables of over 8,000 wires, serving more than a million, and a half people in the metropolitan bay area.

Before beginning to cut the cable he tied two steel ropes to it, one on each side of the place where he was to cut the cable in two. Then as soon as the cable was severed, he pulled a rubber bag over each end to stop the water from penetrating far into the paper-insulated wires. The bags were fastened tightly with marlin, a heavy cord. Then he telephoned to his chief to start raising the ends of the cable.

Most of the twelve cables were cut in this way preparatory to splicing an added section to them in order to move them 1700 feet north. Greatest precautions were taken in planning and executing the job of moving the cables, so that telephone service would not be interrupted. Emergency lines were looked up to replace those of each cable as it was moved, and very few telephones were affected even momentarily, so carefully had the whole job been planned.
