NEPHEW, UNCLE IN DISPUTE AS TO ACCIDENT BLAME

C. L. Harrington, oil company construction superintendent living on Base Line Road near Clavenville school is free on bail on a charge of leaving the scene of an accident, as a result of a mishap last Friday night when his car struck two pupils of the Children's Home of Michigan near Grand River and Tuck Road. Both nurses were seriously hurt, and it was feared one would die. They were taken to Redford Receiving Hospital.

A nephew of Harrington, Floyd Ansonb of Oakwood, near Lapeer, is also involved, and was booked as a material witness. There is a dispute between Harrington and Ansonb as to who was driving the car, which was driven away after the accident. A woman nearby caught part of the license number and the car was traced. Harrington was picked up the next morning and said he had been intoxicated at the time of the accident and remembered nothing, but that his nephew had been driving, according to Deputy Joseph DeVriendt, Ansonb declares Harrington was driving. After the accident, he is reported, left Harrington's home where he had been staying, and went to Oakwood.

The nurses injured are Miss Norma Stephens, 22, and Miss Catherine Brown, 20. They were walking along the road. Miss Stephens is a niece of Mrs. L. Farrand of Farmington.

FIRST WORK GIVEN FARMINGTON MAN BY MACHINE SHOP

One Farmington man was given regular employment this week and indications are that several more men may be employed in the near future by Farmington Manufacturing Co., which is making parts for Ford cars. Carl Harrison began work on Monday at the plant. The company has already turned out over 9,000 water-pump pulleys, and the owners are working three shifts each day to keep up production.

By October 1 it is expected arrangements will be completed for work on water-pump housings, which will require additional men.

The company's furnishing of parts to the motor company is not restricted to its present output, the quantity being limited at present by the capacity of the machinery installed.
