HUNTING LAWS
 1933-34 digest of Michigan hunting laws, now being issued by the Department of Conservation with all hunting licenses, gives sportsmen an additional service through a list of all conservation officers in the state and their addresses.
 The Digests list the officers' names, address, and the county over which they have jurisdiction. The list is expected to be of service, especially to hunters going into strange territory, since they are invited to use the local conservation officers to obtain conservation information.

SAFETY FACTOR
 Grains, even in small amounts, fed dairy cattle will reduce the slight danger of poisoning from Sudan grass pasture, according to animal nutrition specialists at Michigan State College.
 There have been reports of cattle poisoned by eating frosted Sudan grass but efforts made at the College to cause any injurious effects with the grass have failed.

WASH SILKS, RAYONS
ACCORDING TO RULES
 By following a few simple rules suggested by the home economics extension clothing specialists Michigan State College, silks and rayons will retain their original color and finish after laundering. The first and most important rule is to make sure whether the color and texture are washable. This can be done by testing a sample in lukewarm suds for five

minutes, then rinse, dry, and compare with the unwashed fabric. An inconspicuous part of the garment, such as the end of the belt seam, or under hem may be used for testing.
 Only a pure alkali-free soap in flake or bead form should be used, making a rich suds before placing the garment in the water. The temperature of the water must be right, almost cool, never more than 90° F.

NEW HIGHWAY
 A new concrete highway from Ludington to the Big Sable River in the park was formerly opened September 3. The U. S. Bureau of Roads has now authorized the construction of a bridge across the river at that point and continuation of the concrete for a half mile further into the park itself. Numerous park buildings to be constructed by C. C. Clabor are under construction.

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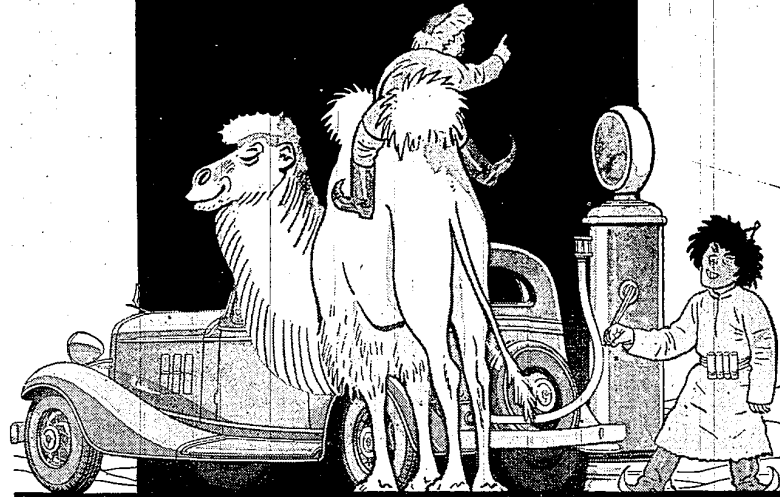
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
