Humus Necessary and

Brings Better Crops

Humus is decaying vegetable matter, such as stable meanure or anything that will rot when turned under the ground, writes a correspondent in the Rural New Yorker. Almost all right soils contain a good supply of homms, while most poor soils are lacking in the Humus keeps the soil lose, preventing a hard crost from forming after rains, keeps the soil warm, so that crops will grow earlier in the spring, and takes care of the wester supply. In wet weather, the homes absorbs the water like a sponge and holds it uttl dry weather when the plants can isse it. Hemus helps to make the plant codaratible.

it. Himms helps to make plant food available. It is hard to make a profitable root and lacking in himms. Homus is usually supplied to the soil by either stable manner or turning under green manure crops. As a good example, of the benefits of humus, almost every farmer, sometime or other, has leemoved a fence that has been standing for years, and when this field is cropped the next time you have noticed that where the fence stood the soil was darker in color and more mellow than the remainder of the field and the plants grow faster, with a darker green color, yielding more. This was caused by the humus that was added to the soil by the decaying the contract of the color weeds that green around the fence every year.
