TENTS OF FUTURE AHEAD IN FIELD OF ILLUMINATION

A glimpse of what the next 25 years may offer in the way of illumination, as well as an interesting review of the history of lighting was given before Farmington Exchange Club Wednesday noon by Lee Taylor, of the Detroit Edison Company.

Homes 25 years from now will probably have no windows; and will be lighted, not by anything, but by artificial means, which is a more dependable and desirable source, Mr. Taylor said. There will be no ceiling or wall fixtures, but an invisible tube of light will extend around all sides of each room, providing an even, restful light in every portion. Eyestrain will be minimized, through better lighting.

Mr. Taylor, with equipment he brought along, illustrated some surprising things which have been learned about vision and lighting, and showed how eyestrain is remarkably decreased by improving illumination.

Mr. Taylor came to the Club as the guest of Earl Grosvenor, manager of the Farmington Edison office.

Occupants called the department. The furnace pipe was removed and water poured down the opening. The fire was controlled with little difficulty.

Mr. and Mrs. McCracken built their new home not long ago. Damage by the fire was slight.
