Moved by Osmus, seconded by Gildemeister that the following be adopted:

Whereas the Supreme Court of Michigan has recently rendered a decision indicating that welfare workers so called are not entitled to Workman's Compensation when injured and

Whereas there is considerable uncertainty as to just what cases would fall within the proper application of this decision and

Whereas this Commission is desirous of maintaining Workman's Compensation coverage for all such workers,

Now therefore be it resolved that the action of the city clerk in executing the endorsement to the Workman's Compensation policy of the Michigan Mutual Liability Company of Detroit, Michigan on the 30th day of October, 1933 is hereby ratified and approved and the disbursing officer authorized and directed to pay the premium therefor. Carried.

Four applications were received for the office of night officer. After being read, Mayor Warner ordered a ballot which resulted in Horace Durham receiving 3 votes and Ed Thayer 2. Moved by Staman, seconded by Hatton that Horace Durham be appointed. Carried.

Motion made by Hatton, seconded by Gildemeister that the city clerk of the city commission ask each known organization within the city to name one member of a committee to work on a welfare organization to relieve the needy within our city. Carried.

Methodist Church, Baptist Church, Evangelical Church, Universalist Church, Our Lady of Sorrows Church, City Commission, High School Faculty, American Legion, American Legion Auxiliary, Eastern Star, Masonic Lodge, Exchange Club, Woman's Club, Business Woman's Club, and the Red Cross.

The above organizations will be asked to name one of their members for that committee.

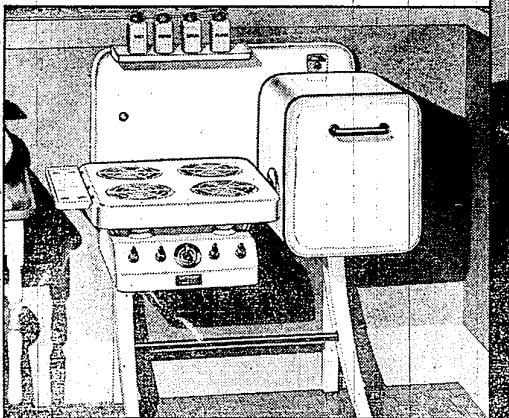

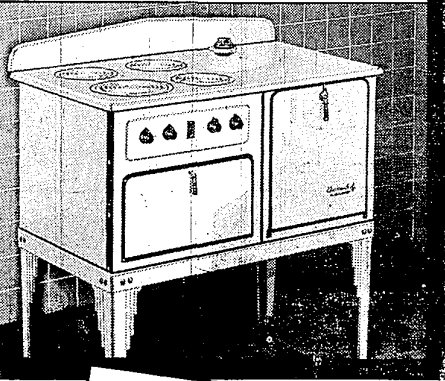
