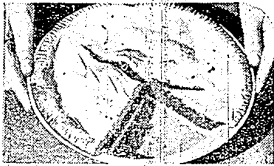

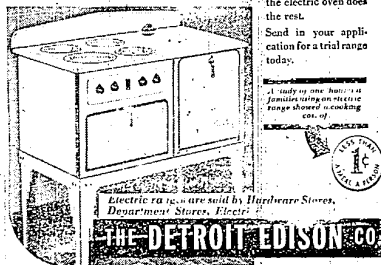

Russian Opera Will Be Given In Detroit

On Sunday, Monday and Tuesday evenings, November 26, 27 and 28 in the large Masonic Auditorium, Detroit, the Russian Opera Company will give the operas: "Boris Godunoff" by Modest Moussorgsky; "Le Coq d'Or" by Rimsky-Korsakoff; "Khorvanshina" by Modest Moussorgsky.

The Russian Opera Company was founded with the idea of affording American audiences an opportunity to hear the rich operatic treasury of the country it represents and this season is being produced here under the direction of its founder, Max Panteleeff.

As general director of the company of 12 Max Panteleeff also supplements his producing activities with appearances in the leading baritone roles of the operas presented. The conductor is Eugene Plotnikoff. The entire personnel consists of expatriated Russians and the operas are presented in the original language. The four hundred brilliant costumes which decorate the production of these three operas are entirely Russian both in design and execution.

Among the distinguished solo artists appearing in the Russian Opera Company are Ivan Ivanoff, Tenor, who not long ago won distinction by creating the title role in "Wozzeck" by Alban Berg, produced at the Metropolitan Opera House, by Leonidof, Bass-Baritone, Stefan Kozlovich, Baritone, who made his first entry into the musical world at the age of eleven as boy soloist with the famous Russian Choir of New York City, Madine Fedora, Contralto, a native of Odessa, Russia who was brought to this country as a small girl and after graduating from high school entered her musical career in concert and radio; Alexis Tcherkassky, Baritone, the son of Princess Marianna (Tcherkassky), formerly Russian donna of the Imperial and Vasily Tcherkassky, Bass-Baritone, a student at the Moscow Philharmonic Institute of music.

Youth, tempered by absolutely finished dancing, dominates the ballet of the Russian Grand Opera as the ballet master, Yemcslav Swoboda, explains. In age the members of the ballet range from seventeen to twenty-two but there is not one of them who is not capable of putting on her own solo performance before a sophisticated audience and winning respect and admiration. The Prima Ballerina, Lydia Anchutina, is only seventeen.
