New Dairy Producers' Group Shows Strength

Association, Mr. Cook said that Mr. Beach to the farmers "something would be done" to help the farmer. "If that is so," said Mr. Cook, "and he is really sincere about it and the Association will work for us 100 per cent, then we are not against the Milk Producers Association but with them 100 per cent, because both are working for the same object—higher milk prices for the producer."

Mr. Cook quoted statistics tending to show that in 1929, almost half of the average family's food cost was for milk. He said that only about one-third goes to the producer of the food.

The agreement signed by members of the new organization provided for a gradual sale of surplus, but this and other provisions might be amended, Mr. Cook stated.

"Mess Up Figures"

Referring to an article in a Detroit Sunday newspaper, which quoted Mr. Beach on prices received by milk producers, the speaker told his audience that "that article messed up the figures just the same as they do in the Milk Messenger, on the prices we get for our milk."

"This new organization is a protest to the Milk Producers' Association, to the people of the State and to the Government," said Mr. Cook. "Price is the chief kick we are making. The Milk Producers Association now acknowledges that they did not take the farmer's costs into consideration in setting the price that is now fixed by code."

Following the brief exchange in which one farmer said he had hoped the purpose was to "wreck the Milk Producers Association," Mr. Cook said that "the Association is O. K. if they will take an interest in the farmer." Applause followed this remark.

Can Force Re-consideration
Mr. Cook urged the farmers to action, reciting a poem of which the theme is, "the wheel that does the speaking is the one that gets the grease." He stated that if 75 per cent of the milk producers, in volume, sign petitions, the Secretary of Agriculture—under the code—is required to open the code for consideration of revision.

It was announced that a meeting of the new group would be held at Salem next Monday night.

Accompanying Mr. Cook were Bert Williams of Rochester in the new movement, and John Lester of the same section. Membership in the new Association is set at 25 cents.
