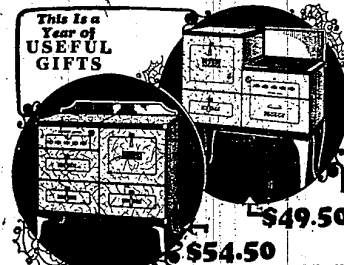

East Lansing, — Commercial producers of flowers are offered a chance to brush up on the newest angles of their business at a short course to be given at Michigan State College, Jan. 2 to March 2. The course is of interest to those desiring to enter the business as well as to those already engaged in producing flowers or vegetables under glass. Instructors will be members of the College staff or prominent floriculturists who have been successful commercially.

Lectures and practical work in the laboratories will occupy the time of the students. Soil conditions, insect and disease control, and allied subjects will be included in the course.
