

MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENT
DEFENDED IN RADIO TALK

Ann Arbor—Criticism of municipal governments for not making radical reductions in their total expenditures during depression years is usually unjustified because certain city services cannot be cut below a dangerous minimum and because the field of possible reductions is seriously restricted by the inescapable debt payments which make such big holes in their budgets.

Clared Professor Thomas H. Reed, director of the bureau of government in the University of Michigan radio address this afternoon.

Savings which are made, amounting to 25 per cent of the budget in some cities, are swallowed up in the heavy welfare de-

mands which towns of all sizes must meet in times of economic upset, he continued. Prof. Reed spoke recently on the national hook-up of the Committee on Civic Education by Radio, on "Borrowing for Current Needs," and will talk again on January 9 in this series of "Modernizing the Mechanism of Local Finance."

Police, fire, health and school departments cannot be cut below a protective level without both immediate and future bad effects, while blinding slashing of health and school budgets "is especially deplorable because these services actually face heavier work loads during bad times, full school terms and facilities being particularly needed to keep children of the streets and away from undesirable associations."

Lansing, Mich.—The legality of Michigan's chain store tax is being considered by Circuit Judge Robert M. Toms of Wayne County, following arguments last Friday. At the present time 100 chains representing 591 stores have paid the chain store tax while 27 of the larger companies are testing the validity of the law. Of these companies, 26 are joined together in the suit in Wayne County while the 27th company last week filed a bill for a permanent injunction against the collection of the tax, in Shiawassee County.

DETECTOR PERFECTED

Ann Arbor—A simple test for detecting and accurately reterming the amount of carbon monoxide in the blood of persons supposed to have died from this gas, or to be suffering from chronic poisoning, is now available to small hospital and city health laboratories with the perfection of a method designed by Dr. A. A. Christman, of the University of Michigan department of physiological chemistry, and reported in the current Journal of Biological Chemistry.
