COMMISSIONERS' PROCEEDINGS

Regular meeting of the Commission of Farmington, held December 4, 1933.
Called to order by Mayor Warner at 8:10 p. m.
Commissioners present: Gildemeister, Hatton, Stamann, and Oshubury.
Minutes of the meeting of November 6 read and approved.
Motion made by Gildemeister, seconded by Stamann that the following resolution be adopted:

Resolution introduced by Commissioner Gildemeister, seconded by Commissioner Stamann, at the regular meeting of the Commission of the City of Farmington on December 4, 1933, as follows: Whereas, on or about the 19th day of April 1933, William Davis of the City of Farmington was injured while operating the dump owned by the City of Farmington, and

Whereas, for several months said William Davis has not received his compensation due him under the Workmen's Compensation Law due to a contest by the insurance company relative to the City's liability thereon, and

Whereas, said William Davis has a large family, and is in need of funds at the present time, Therefore, be it resolved that the city of Farmington advance to said William Davis at the present time the sum of One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, and take his receipt therefor, said One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars to be paid to Floyd T. Schermerhorn, the attorney representing the said William Davis before the Department of Labor and Industry, and provided further that said One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars is to be repaid to the City of Farmington at such time or times as the said William Davis shall be financially able to do so.

Forest products ranked fourth in value among all farm crops in the southern states in 1932. Woods products cut and sold from southern farms brought farmers a cash income of more than \$20,000,000 and were exceeded in value only by cotton, tobacco and potatoes. Approximately one-fourth of the farm area of the South, or 70,000,000 acres, is in forest or woodlands. To increase the income from farm woodlands and forests, the forest service advocates the adoption of selective cutting methods for sustained annual yields of high quality, and the improvement and extension of forest control. State foresters, state colleges of agriculture, the United States Department of Agriculture, and a large number of farmers are co-operating to bring about more efficient use of the forests.

RED CROSS RELIEF AID DISTRESSED IN 120 DISASTERS

Help Given in Fires, Floods, Earthquake and Epidemics Part of Year's Task

The American Red Cross has reached into the homes of six million families in the past year with unemployment and disaster relief. Chairman John Bar to Payne announced.

"As the year closed the organization continued in readiness to serve in the forthcoming winter at the point of greatest need and to adjust its service to meet the calls of the emergency of unemployment and disaster," Chairman Payne stated.

In a year of greatest economic distress in the nation's history, in which the Red Cross ably discharged a relief task in distributing food and clothing to distressed families in all but six of the nation's 48 states, the organization also was called into action in the disasters, of which 92 were within the borders of the United States.

Barbaric, floods, hurricanes, fires and other disasters visited death and destruction upon the lives and homes of thousands of people. Red Cross statistics showed that in the 120 disasters almost a thousand lives were lost, 148,440 homes were destroyed or damaged, 12,175 persons were injured, and Red Cross relief was given to 453,579 individuals.

In giving aid in these disasters, in the unemployment relief and in handling the distribution of government wheat and cotton, the Red Cross expended from its national treasury the sum of \$1,074,841.

Over one period of twelve weeks 46 disasters occurred in 32 states. Red Cross disaster workers were hard pressed in meeting all of these needs occurring at once, but everywhere misery was promptly relieved.

Support of the Red Cross work is through its annual roll call, conducted by chapters in the period from November 1 to Thanksgiving Day. November 1 to November 15, 1933, the Red Cross was aided by 1,074,841 individuals who joined the Red Cross as a member and in carrying relief to disaster victims and in other Red Cross service, such as preservation of life, child welfare through the Junior Red Cross, and direct service for the public health.

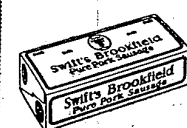
