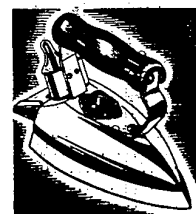

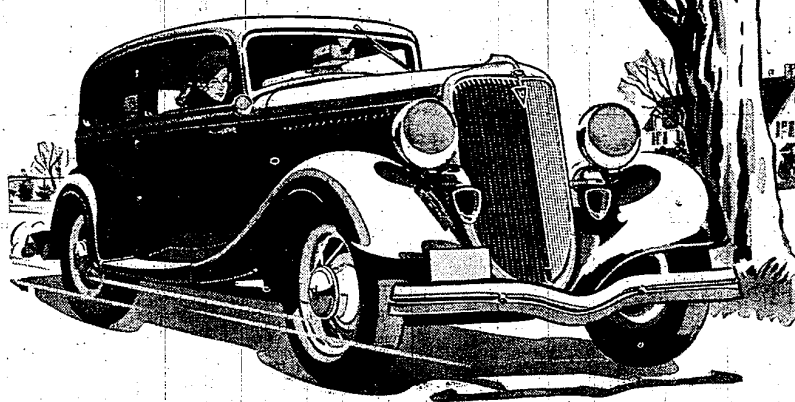

**MICHIGAN FARMERS'****LAND-BANK-LOANS IN**

NOVEMBER, IS \$729,000

Loans made to 446 Michigan farmers during November by the Federal Land Bank of St. Paul totaled \$729,000, which was practically twice as much as Michigan farmers received during the first 11 months of last year according to figures just compiled at Farm Credit Administration headquarters in St. Paul.

The rapid stepping up in the closing of loans is illustrated by comparison of monthly totals since the rush began with enactment of legislation by the special session. This was climaxed by the November figures which showed that 128 more Michigan farmers got loans in that month than during the previous 10 months, and that the November loans exceeded the previous 10 months' loans by approximately \$175,600.
