

SERVICE HELD FOR S. WARNER, NATIVE OF FARMINGTON

Seth Andrew Lemoyne Warner, of Alpena, Michigan, died Friday evening, December 1, after an illness of three years of paralysis. Mr. Warner was born in Farmington 93 years ago, and was the son of Seth A. Lemoyne Warner and Emma Palmer who were pioneers in the Township of Farmington.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the home of his daughter, in Alpena, conducted by the Knight Templars, of which order he had been a member for many years. He leaves in his immediate family, his wife, formerly Miss Emily Walker, a son Will S. Warner of Tacoma, Washington, a daughter Mrs. W. H. Davison, in whose home he spent his last years, and a sister, Mrs. Minnie E. Wilber, of Farmington.

Interment was in the Farmington Cemetery.

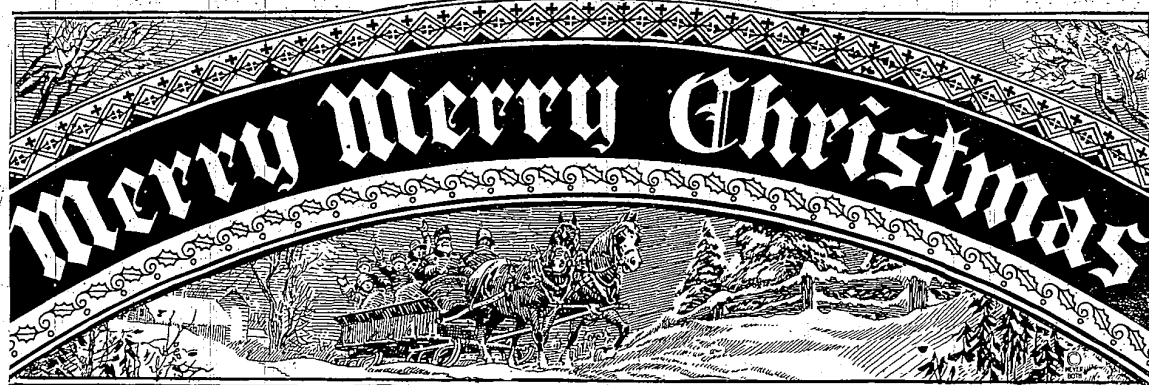
