Around the Home

The Toothbrush Cupboard

What kind of care do you take of the family toothbrushes. Do they hang on hooks or on a rack directly over the bathroom basin, where they are exposed to dust, flying soap flakes, odors, and dampness generally? Of course, that will never do.



Madam Housewife! The dentists tell us that almost as many of our tooth troubles come from germ-laden toothbrushes as from food decay. A toothbrush that is never thoroughly dried, never subjected to a good disinfectant, never sunned and aired and made sweet and wholesome, is not the implement to put into our own and our children's mouths. A damp toothbrush to which a coating of toothpaste still clings, attracts all sorts of invisible forms of decomposition, and the brush, which isn't thoroughly rinsed and dried is as unhealthful as a half-closed, half-damp garment or half-clean, half-dry bedding.

The best way to treat a toothbrush is to dip it, after using, into some good antiseptic solution. A glass containing one teaspoon of a powerful disinfectant mixed with ten teaspoons of water is an efficient germ-killer. Some dentists recommend denatured alcohol or medicated alcohol.

After dipping the brushes in this solution, put them in a wide-mouthed bottle, brush end out, and stand them in the sunshine until absolutely dry. It is said that the direct rays of the sun kill germs, whereas the rays which come through glass will not.

If the sun is not shining, dry the brushes over the radiator. When the brushes are ready for use again, hang them in a special little cupboard, kept scrupulously clean, where they will be free from the dust and floating soap-particles in the bathroom. Individual holders for the brushes are good provided the brushes are perfectly dry; but the circulation of some air is good for them. The main thing is to see that all food particles, bits of toothpaste or powder, and other germ-producing matter is entirely removed after every using, and that the brush is first disinfected and then dried.

Menus Suggested By College Specialists

Tasty combinations for quick luncheons may be found among the canned goods on hand in the house. With the approach of the busy holiday season, homemakers will welcome suggestions for menus which require the least time and effort to prepare.

The menus, suggested by home economics food specialists, Michigan State College, are as follows: Cream of tomato soup, crackers, egg-tuna fish salad on spinach mounds, pickles, cinnamon toast, tea or milk;

Baked ham and pineapple slices, creamed noodles, string beans in sour sauce, bread, butter, toasted crackers, jam, coffee or milk;

Creamed salmon and peas on toast or crackers, apple-carrot nut salad, olives, graham cracker sandwich, tea or milk;

Cheese-pea-pickle salad; thin biscuits, butter, escalloped tomatoes, chocolate nut pudding, salted crackers, tea or milk;

Creamed dried beef on toast, corn fritters or bread and butter, mixed fruit salad, vanilla wafers, coffee substitute.

Baked eggs in bacon rings, harvard beets, toasted peanut butter sandwiches, pear sauce, ginger-snaps, cocoa;

Canned sweet potatoes with browned marshmallows, -canned corned beef, buttered green beans, bread and butter, plum sauce, crisp cookies, tea or milk;

MEAT, POTATOES and GRAVY

Many a meal is built around these three standbys—meat, potatoes and gravy. Invariably they are the first dishes that come to your mind as you plan your dinner.

But in spite of their hunger-satisfying and nourishing qualities, this time-honored triumvirate can become monotonous unless it is supplemented by other dishes.

However, it is often a problem to find these "side dishes" in your own head. Of course you can quiz your neighbor, or ask the members of your family what they would like. But even this source of information is often lacking in ideas.

The thing to do is read the advertisements in the Enterprise. Every week your local markets display their foodstuffs on these printed pages. You'll read of new vegetables and fruits that have "just arrived." Your appetite will be aroused by the tasty creations of national food manufacturers. With pencil and paper you can make your market list and menus before you step out of the house.

Speaking of monotony, consider this. There are 11 different cuts of beef, 9 cuts of veal, 7 of lamb, 10 of pork; there are at least 20 different breakfast cereals sold in every shop, 16 different canned vegetables, 6 canned fruits, a dozen or more canned meats and fish, numberless varieties of cakes and crackers. Why should there be monotony in meals with such a variety of foods available at your store and so many of them advertised in your paper?
