Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Roach and children spent Christmas Day with Mr. and Mrs. M. S. Pratt of Pontiac.

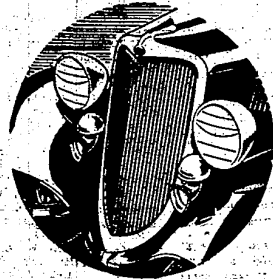
