There's Gold in Them Thar Springs

A bit of precious metal forming the contact point on a spring may seem to be an insignificant item in a system so complex as the modern telephone plant. The reclaimed value of such a contact point would seem so inconsequential that one could hardly imagine that it would be profitable to salvage such tiny bits of metal from the bulk of obsolete telephone equipment that arrives at the Western Electric Hawthorne Works every year.

However, science comes to industry's aid, and each year from 8,000 to 10,000 Troy ounces of precious metals, largely gold and platinum, are reclaimed at a real economy to the telephone companies. This is another example of the scientist applying his knowledge to industrial problems.

A fully equipped laboratory has been especially designed to handle

the precious metal. The contacts which cannot be used in the condition in which they are received from the telephone companies are put into a solution of nitric and hydrochloric acid. The gold is precipitated from the solution as gold sponge after suitable manipulation by sodium oxalate. The platinum is precipitated by ammonium chloride as ammonium chloroplatinate, which is subsequently ignited to form sponge platinum.

The reclaimed metals are alloyed in proportions suitable for the contact alloy requirements, and made into tape and wire for use in the manufacture of new contacts. In addition to the precious metal salvaged from old telephone apparatus, approximately 2,000 Troy ounces of gold are recovered each year from gold plated parts, spent gold plating solutions, and class water from gold plating operations.

Cover Crop Time

Cover crops help ripen the wood of orchard trees in preparation for winter. They also add humus to the soil when turned under and help fallow leaves in the orchard to add more humus. Another important duty of cover crops is to protect the tree roots against winter freezing and to hold snow in the orchard as a protective blanket for the roots. Cover crops which live through the winter help to prevent soil washing and conserve nutrients, but their greatest disadvantage lies in the fact that they make most of their growth in the spring when they take moisture and plant food away from the trees. Among plants used for cover crops to be sowed in the orchard are vetch, alfalfa, buckwheat, barley, rye, millet, vetch and peas.

Around the Farm

A ton of alfalfa removes about 50 pounds of lime from the soil.
Alfalfa in the Nevada desert near Las Vegas was found to grow 42 inches in 23 days.

Four carloads of white arsenic, four carloads of blackstrap molasses and several carloads of bran were used by the state of Wisconsin in fighting grasshoppers in 33 northern counties of the state this year.
