Don Riley, Aileen Riley, Ivan Cox and Lucette Moss visited Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Bingham on Sunday.

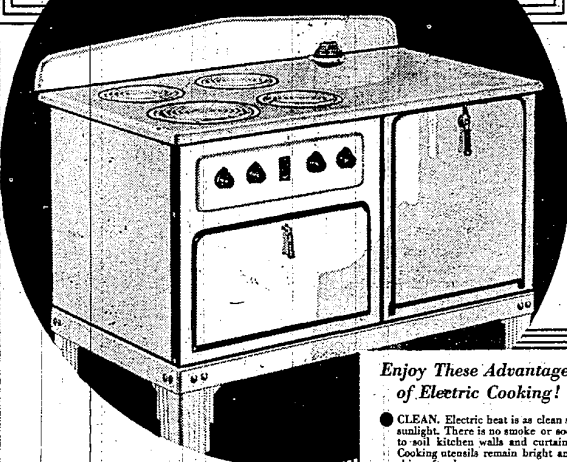
